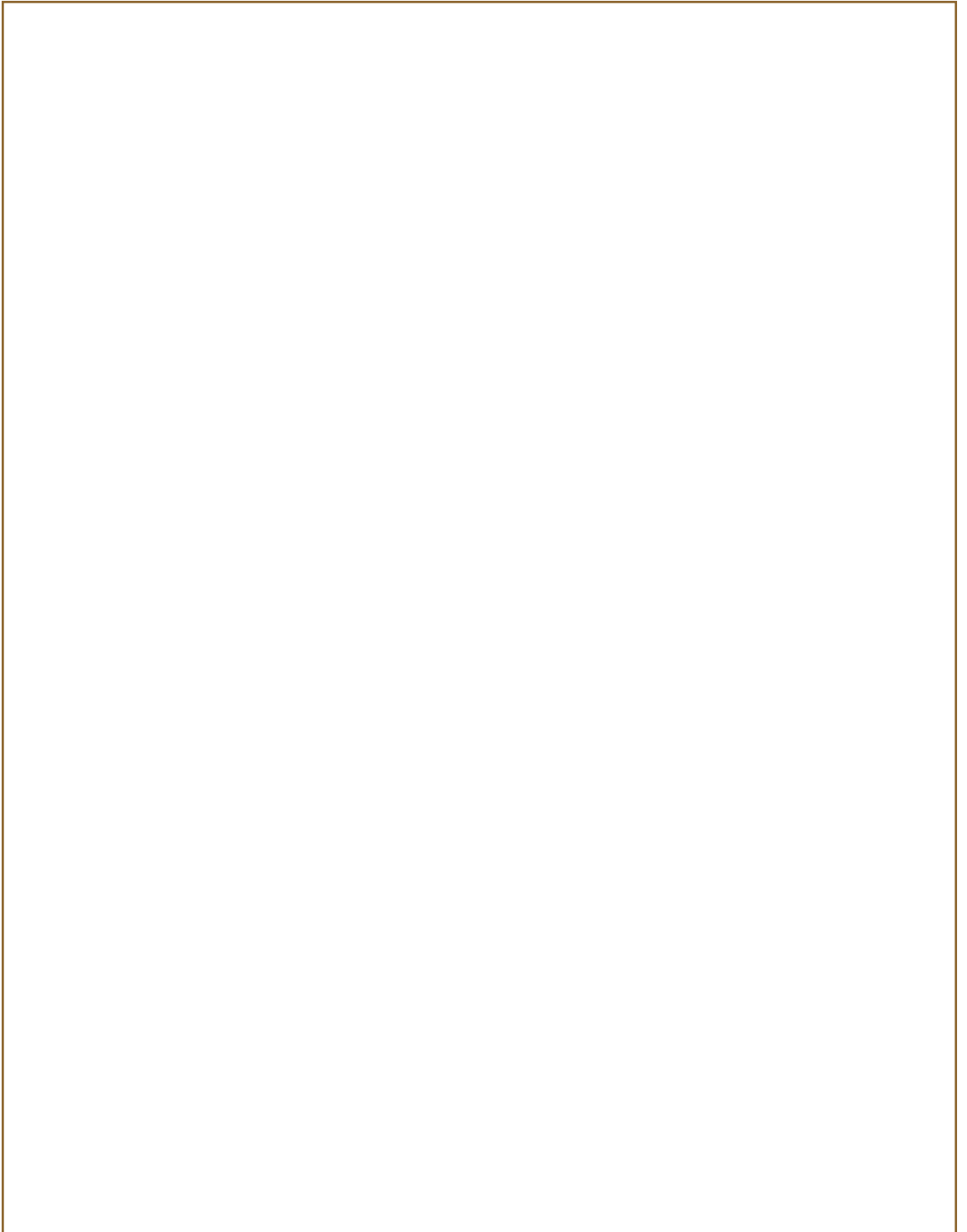

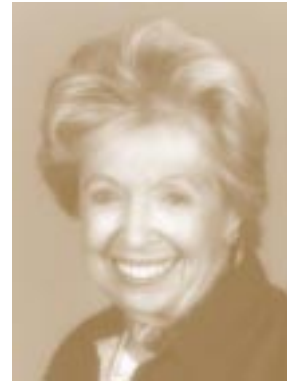
To the Board of Directors we extend our gratitude for their on-going counsel and support.

DEAR ABBY



The saga of DEAR ABBY is an acknowledged phenomenon of contemporary journalism. With a daily readership of more than 95 million, the column has a devoted following who wouldn't dream of starting their day without first reading DEAR ABBY.

It began in January 1956, when Pauline Phillips, a 37-year-old newcomer to the San Francisco area, impulsively phoned the editor of the San Francisco Chronicle and told him she could write a better advice column than the one she had been reading in his newspaper. To her surprise, he challenged her to come in for an interview. She went.

Pauline Phillips introduced herself as an average, middle-aged housewife who had been happily married to the same man for 17 years, and had reared two reasonably normal teenaged children.

She explained that although she had taken journalism in college, she had never written professionally, but she knew she could write an advice column because all her life she had been an "amateur wailing wall without portfolio." She had trained Gray Ladies (hospital volunteers) for the American Red Cross and served as president of her local mental health society.

After hearing her modest credentials, the busy editor wanted only to get this self-styled journalist out of his office, so he asked her to write sample replies to some of their previously published columns. She did.

The rest is history. She chose the pseudonym "Abigail Van Buren" and named her column "DEAR ABBY."

DEAR ABBY's success was instant. Because of her wit, wisdom and common sense approach, she became nationally syndicated in less than two months. Mail poured in.

When her secretaries were swamped by the onslaught, she recruited her 14-year-old daughter, Jeanne, who, under her mother's watchful eye, earned her allowance responding to mail from other teenagers. Within a year, DEAR ABBY was being read in all the major newspapers throughout the nation.

In 1980, Jeanne became DEAR ABBY's executive editor.

By 1987, the mother-daughter partnership was co-creating the most popular advice column in the world — known for its uncommon common sense and youthful perspective.

In recognition of their lifetime of dedicated service in helping others, Didi Hirsch Community Mental Health Center is proud to honor these two extraordinary women with this year's Leadership Award.



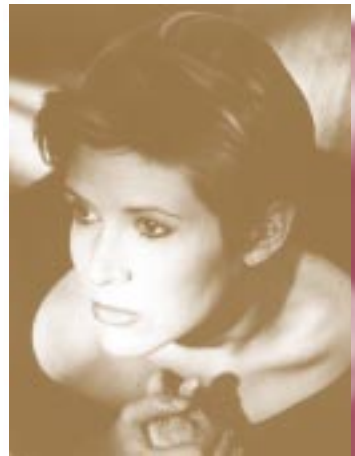

JIM GIGGANS

MASTER OF CEREMONIES



Award-winning newscaster Jim Giggans is the co-anchor of NBC4's "Today in LA: Weekend," airing Saturdays 7-8AM and Sundays 8-9AM. Giggans also serves as general assignment reporter for the "Channel 4 News."

Giggans joined NBC4 in September 1981 as general assignment reporter and has since covered a number of significant stories. In 1997 he covered the tragic death of Princess Diana in Paris and her funeral in London. He reported on the Rodney King beating and ensuing Los Angeles riots in 1992, where he was stationed in South Central Los Angeles, the heart of the disturbance. In October 1993, Giggans conducted an exclusive interview with President Clinton from the Oval Office regarding the controversial NAFTA agreement, and, in 1994, he covered the first Menendez brothers trial. In addition, he reported on the devastating 1994 Southern California firestorms and Northridge earthquake. He was honored as Broadcast Journalist of the Year in 1995 by the Los Angeles Society of Professional Journalists. Giggans was named permanent anchor of NBC4's "Today in LA: Weekend" along with Tracie Savage in October 1995.

Prior to joining NBC4, Giggans was a morning anchor and general assignment reporter at KNXT-TV from 1978 to 1981. While there, Giggans was nominated for a Los Angeles area Emmy Award for his special, "PCP: Introduction to a Crisis." In 1968, Giggans joined ABC News as a producer, director and writer based at the network's New York headquarters. In 1970, he became ABC's foreign correspondent based in Saigon. For his coverage of the region, Giggans was nominated for three Emmys and won a 1973 award from the National Association of Media Women for his "Outstanding Vietnam Coverage." From 1973 to 1975, Giggans was ABC's foreign correspondent based in Paris, where he covered the Middle East and Northern Ireland. He earned the prestigious National Press Club Award for his coverage of the Greek/Turkish War in Cyprus.

Giggans earned his bachelor's degree in political science from the University of Washington in Seattle. He received his master's degree in international politics from La Sorbonne, La Faculté de Droit et Sciences and L'Institute de Sciences Politiques in Paris. A native of Seattle, Giggans is married, has two school-aged children and two adult children and lives in Pacific Palisades.

FIRST LADY OF CALIFORNIA  
SHARON DAVIS  
LEADERSHIP AWARD PRESENTER



Sharon Davis focuses her attention on issues that affect children's health, safety and well being. Both Governor Davis and the First Lady share a commitment to the State's most precious resource, California's children. The First Lady's vision of ensuring that all children be nurtured and cared for in a safe, protective environment complements the Governor's priority of strengthening education for California's six million public school children.

As First Lady, Sharon Davis is an effective advocate for children by focusing on education and health issues. She visits schools throughout the state to encourage students to raise their expectations and performance as well as to promote parental involvement.

The First Lady is the official spokesperson for the Healthy Families Program, California's health insurance program that provides full medical, dental, and vision care coverage for children of working families. Since Governor Gray Davis took office, the number of children enrolled in Healthy Families has increased by 300 percent.

The First Lady plays a key role in the California Mentor Initiative which assists the Davis Administration's goal to recruit one million new mentors across the state. Mentors offer young people encouragement, friendship and motivation to help them not only excel academically, but in every aspect of their lives.

Each year in October, the First Lady hosts the annual Governor's Conference for Women, the most prestigious one-day women's conference in the nation, bringing together 10,000 women from diverse backgrounds. She has also participated in the Habitat for Humanity First Ladies Build national program.

In the early 1990s, First Lady Sharon Davis was founder and managing partner of the Davis Miller Company, a public relations firm specializing in high-tech companies and consumer products. She previously served as Program Director for a non-profit foundation, with a \$3 million annual giving program. The First Lady grew up in the San Diego suburb of Santee with her parents, Donald and Mary Ryer, her sister and five brothers. She studied journalism at California State University, Sacramento.

PATTY DUKE

LEADERSHIP AWARD PRESENTER



*P*atty Duke, Academy Award winning actress, past president of the Screen Actors Guild, and best-selling author, has been delighting and challenging audiences for more than 40 years with her work in movies and on television.

Her Oscar-winning portrayal of blind, mute and deaf Helen Keller in “The Miracle Worker” launched Patty as one of America’s finest young talents in the 1960s. Still a teenager, she went on to enjoy success in “The Patty Duke Show” before establishing herself as one of television’s most versatile and beloved actresses.

Although she has acted in a wide range of projects, Patty’s television movie credits often involve stories dealing with controversial or challenging subjects: “Call Me Anna,” in which she played herself and her struggle with mental illness; “Last Wish,” an adaptation of Betty Rollin’s book about helping her cancer-stricken mother commit suicide; “Love Lessons,” in which she played a 50-year-old married woman who discovers she is pregnant; and the after-school special “Please Don’t Hit Me, Mom,” which dealt with child abuse.

Throughout her career, Patty has made many guest appearances in such successful television shows as “Police Story” and “The Streets of San Francisco,” and in 1982 returned to series television in “It Takes Two” with Richard Crenna.

During the course of her career in television, she has received 11 Emmy nominations and three Emmys, two Golden Globes, and a People’s Choice Award. One of her greatest personal achievements was winning the People’s Choice Award for her role in “It Takes Two,” in which she and Crenna portrayed a couple juggling the demands of their professional and personal lives. This is a role Patty knows well. In addition to being a respected actress, she is also wife to Michael Pearce, mother and stepmother to eight children, and author of two best-selling books on her life and her struggle with mental illness.

Her 1987 autobiography “Call Me Anna” recounts the pain of her early years separated from her family while pursuing an acting career and the tumultuous adult years before she was diagnosed as suffering from manic-depression. In her 1992 “A Brilliant Madness,” she joined with medical reporter Gloria Hochman to write about the effects of her illness, diagnosis and treatment, and offer a guide to others suffering from manic-depressive illness.

Her very public discussion of her struggle with mental illness has earned Patty the Eleanor Roosevelt Award for her work on behalf of women’s rights and the gratitude of many who, encouraged by her candor, seek treatment without the fear of stigma.

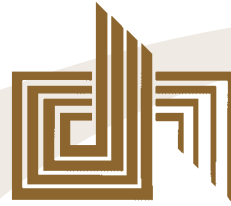
## HISTORY

The Center was founded as the first community-based adult outpatient clinic in Los Angeles. With the inspiration and generosity of Mrs. I. Kingdon (Didi) Hirsch, the Center's Culver City headquarters were established in 1974.

At 12 service sites and many schools throughout the County, we provide treatment regardless of an individual's ability to pay, creating a safety net for those in need. We offer services to the working poor and uninsured, and to those unable to find help elsewhere.

We invite you to visit the Center to see for yourself the range of care that we provide — from our 24-hour emergency crisis line to day treatment to community outreach. It is your support that makes our work possible.
